

# AFRICA TRAVEL ASSOCIATION AND CAMEROON PARTNER TO INCREASE TOURISM TO WEST AND CENTRAL AFRICA

The Africa Travel Association, the leader in tourism promotion to Africa, held its 38th Annual Congress in Buea, Cameroon from October 16-20, 2013. Under the banner of "Re-Discovering Cameroon," nearly 200 international and local delegates, including tourism ministers from Cameroon, Uganda and Zimbabwe and representatives from the public and private sectors, gathered at the newly-opened Mountain Hotel to explore how tourism is one of the most promising industries across Africa and an evolving industry in Cameroon.

The Congress was hosted by the Cameroon Ministry of Tourism and Leisure under the auspices of Honorable Minister of State, Minister of Tourism and Leisure, Bella Bouba Maigari. In his opening remarks, the Minister said, "The 38th edition of ATA's Congress in Buea is taking place at a time when tourism, a sector with a strong added value that cuts across sectors, is ranked as one of the biggest industries in the world. The important role it plays in Cameroon's economy contributes significantly to improving the trade balance.

The 2013 event took place in the English-speaking Southwest part of the country with a focus on Buea, the capital of the Southwest region, and Limbe, a seaside city on the southern slopes of Mount Cameroon, one of Africa's highest peaks and largest volcanoes. Known for its rich and fertile soil, the Southwest is home to a range of plantations, including tea, palm oil, rubber and bananas.

The region is also home to the Limbe Wildlife Center. A former zoo, today it's a wildlife rescue and rehabilitation project with critically endangered wildlife species including gorillas, chimpanzees, and several species of monkeys, among some reptiles and birds. The Botanical Gardens next to the center offers tourists an overview of Cameroon's flora and fauna. Another top tourism site includes the historic eighteenth century slave trade port at Bimbia, which once

was one of the busiest slave-ship departure points on Africa's Atlantic Coast to plantations in North and South America and across the Sahara.

# **AFRICA AT THE 2014 WINTER OLYMPICS IN SOCHI**

Despite the general <u>lack of snow</u> in Africa, athletes from 3 (possibly 4) African nations will compete in the <u>2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi</u> (7 - 23 February). It will be the first time

both <u>Togo</u> and <u>Zimbabwe</u> are represented at a Winter Olympics. The athletes are largely self-financed and share a common dream that embodies the Olympic spirit. None are expected to medal. For most of them, just qualifying for the Olympics and getting to Sochi is reason enough to celebrate.

Just ask the young Sive Speelman, a South African athlete who narrowly missed his chance to compete in Sochi. It would have been the "feel-good" story of these Winter Olympics, dashed by South Africa's own Olympic committee (SASCOC). Speelman comes from a poor background, and grew up in rural Eastern Cape, an area that does actually see snowfall most years. He would have been one of the very few black Alpine skiers to compete at any Winter Olympics. Speelman found out just a few days before the event that the SASCOC ruled he did not qualify to compete, despite being invited to Sochi by the IOC. Read more on this story...

It is the case that many African athletes fail to even get to the Olympics because of a lack of money as well as sports equipment and training facilities (no snow is of course a major setback). The athletes that do make it scrape up money to train in Europe, Canada or the US. Some put wheels under their skis to be able to train at home. Find out below who Africa's Winter Olympians are, what sports they will compete in, and check back for their results.

#### Zimbabwe

Generations of Zimbabweans have never even seen a dusting of snow fall on their beautiful land, but there is a Zimbabwe Snow Sports Association and they have their first winter Olympian to support - 20 year old Alpine skier, <u>Luke Steyn</u>. Steyn has had to hone his skills in the US, New Zealand and Chile. This past winter he drove all over Europe trying to compete to get enough points to qualify for Sochi. He'll be competing in the slalom and giant slalom events. Steyn is unlikely to medal, but I'm positive that sports mad Zimbabwe will be behind him all the way.

## Togo

Mathilde-Amivi Petitjean will be the first athlete to represent Togo at the Winter Olympics, she will compete in cross-country skiing. Mathilde was born in Africa, in Niger in fact, but her mother is Togolese. While there may be few Togolese who had heard of her before she qualified for the Sochi Olympics, she is now well known in the small West African nation (which has never seen snow). The Togolese Ski Federation apparently got in touch with Mathilde last year and asked her to compete for her mother's nation. While an excellent skier, she would not have made the French team, so she's just proud and happy to be able to compete and get experience at this level.

Alessia Afi Dipol will compete in the slalom alpine ski event at Sochi for Togo and is rumored to be the flag-bearer for the team. Alessia represented India in the past two years, was born and raised in Italy, but has switched to Togo for these Olympics. There is some confusion about her Togolese roots, as she does not appear to have a close family connection t the country!

A third Togolese athlete, Awa Tomety, still waits to qualify and potentially join her two compatriots in Sochi.

#### Morocco

Morocco has some ski slopes and a ski team but were embarrassed by the performance of their Alpine skiers in the 1992 Olympics. Several athletes were disqualified, one kept falling down, another was lapped during the giant slalom. Since then they've been frugal in who they send. In 2006, Morocco hoped to send Africa's first female Alpine skiier to the Olympics, Sarah Ben Mansour, but she got injured and could not compete.

This year (2014) Morocco is sending two teenage skiers to Sochi - Adam Lamhamedi and Kenza Tazi. Adam is half Canadian, and half Moroccan. He won a gold medal in the 2012 Junior Olympics and will compete in the slalom and giant slalom events.

Kenza Tazi will compete in the women's slalom and giant slalom events. She attends a sports high school in France and competes regularly on the junior circuit.

## Algeria

In 2010, at the age of 17, the cross-country skier Mehdi Selim Khelifi was the only Algerian present at the games in Vancouver where he finished a respectable 84 (out of 94) in the Men's 15 km freestyle. He was still waiting to hear if he qualified for Sochi at the end of January 2014.
